ASVAB Test

- Assessment of student's ability to learn new skills
- Predictor of success in training and education programs

Word Knowledge Ability to understand the meaning of words through synonyms	Paragraph Comprehension Ability to obtain information from written material

Interpreting Test Scores

- Score sheets show students' areas of strength and areas of potential growth
- Scores motivate students to go forward
- Schools receive roster of scores and electronic aggregate data available upon request
- Career resources provide tutorials that show the relationship between test scores and occupations



FYI and OCCU-Find

- Reveals work-related interests types that link to career development and enjoyment of life
- Exposes students to career exploration opportunities and develop a career focus
- Helps students understand difference between careers and work
- Validates relationship between strengths and interests
- Broadens student exploration of careers vs narrowing focus

Administering the ASVAB Test

What Role Does the School Play?

- Determines test date
- Sets aside a quiet, well-lit room for three hours

What Role Does the ASVAB Program Play?

- Administers and proctors the test
- Arranges follow-up interpretation session




ASVAB Program and the Military

- Civilian education services specialists administer ASVAB Program
- Schools determine whether or not student information is released to the military
- Recruiters serve as test proctors only; they are expressly prohibited from recruiting actions during test administration
- Program is provided to schools whether information is released to military recruiters or not
 - Participants have no obligation to speak to a recruiter or pursue a military career
 - 49% of participants intend on going to a 4-year college; 13% have an interest in military careers
